In 2011, a reference request from our Director to assist with a historical lecture on the birth of alcohol studies in the U.S. sparked a chain of events leading to:


- A large scale in-house search for historical materials

- A heightened awareness of the library's unique and rare collections, and the need to digitize these resources
- Creation of a digital archive (ALCVault) to provide access

Cashing in


Feeling the unity of the Center through the material discovered made us realize the potential to reunify the Center divisions based on practices of the founders.




